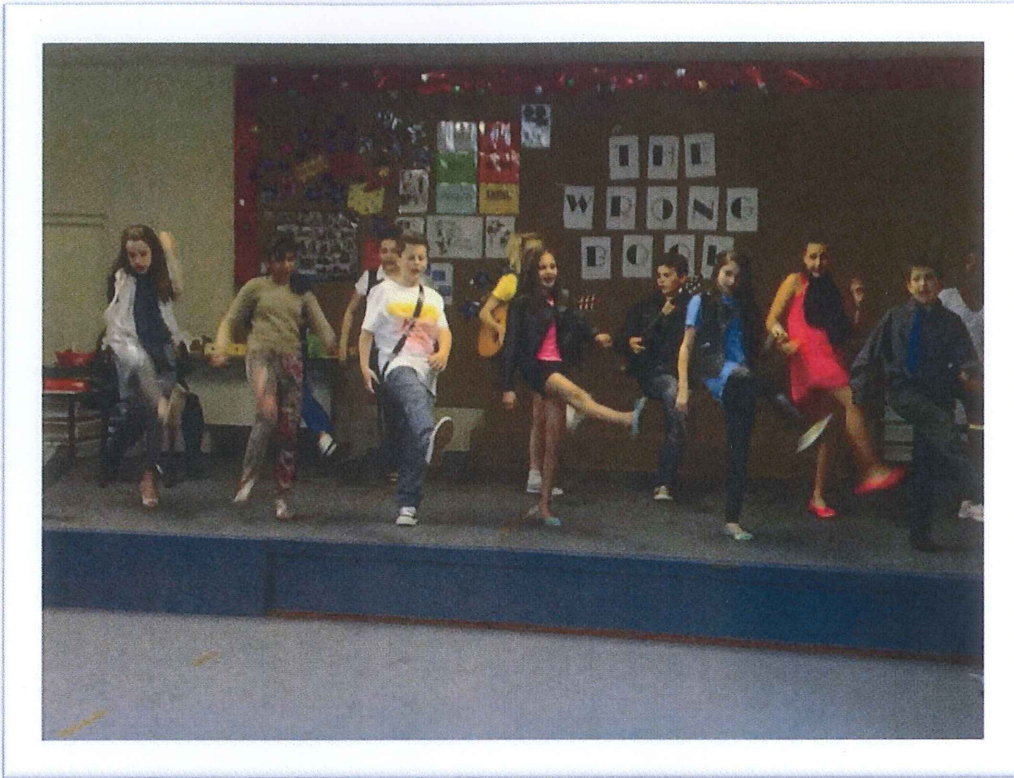


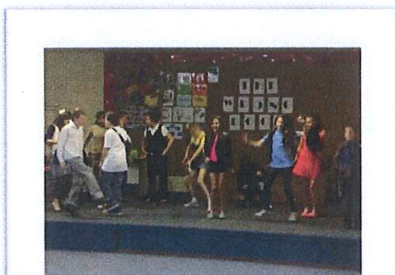
# From the Principal
